Rally class on Tuesday nights, offer both beginners

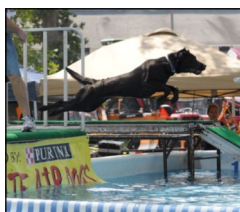

Building Maintenance

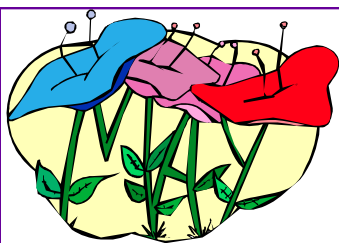

IT'S A SPRING FLING LAND WORK DAY

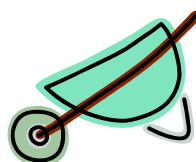

At the Gem City Agility trial held in October, my tri-colored sheltie, Tucker, qualified for the AKC National Agility Championships held in Reno, Nevada. Since I thought it would be one of the few times I would ever get to go to a National Championship, we packed up the CR-V and Tucker, Dazzle, my husband Lee, and I headed to Reno, Nevada last Monday night.

It was a whirlwind trip. We traveled through 3 time zones, wind gusts to 50 mph, snow, 84 degrees and sunshine. We lost both low beam headlights and had to replace them in the parking lot of the hotel in Reno. The wind blew the driver's side windshield wiper off the car and we had to find a Walmart in Salt Lake City, Utah to replace that.

Despite the car adventures, Tucker and I had some nice runs. We ran 5 courses over the weekend. We were clean in 3 of the 5, but a timer glitch and my lack of persuasion kept us from one of the ribbons. Tucker and I had a clean run in the warm up standard course on Friday. Also on Friday, Tucker bailed off a squeaky teeter in the Time to Beat sequence (Teeters have always been her nemesis.) but she successfully crossed the same teeter in the hybrid run on Sunday.

For all of those in Rob and Kandy Robinson's class, we successfully executed a "backy-uppie" in that same hybrid sequence. Tucker and I qualified and received our green ribbon for the standard run on Saturday.

All-in-all we were happy with the weekend. We got a ribbon from the AKC Nationals; Tucker got to partake of all kinds of different treat experiences; we were successful in most of our runs and even when we didn't qualify, we completed the tricky portions of the sequences. The best part of all was getting to cross the country with my husband and dogs to compete with some of the best dog/handler teams in the nation. What an awesome experience!

a couple of members who would be interesting in learning how to set up our timing system at AKC trials. Mike Kacik is our current timer guru, but everyone needs a backup crew. Volunteers would be responsible for making arrangements for getting the all the timing equipment to the trial, unpacking and setting it up, and making sure it is re-packed correctly after the trial. Our timers are very expensive pieces of equipment that needs to be taken care of properly. Please let

Equipment maintenance is also another time consuming but necessary job. It seems like a never ending battle to keep things in good repair. Important Rules to Remember...

When training at the building or land outside of classes, please be considerate of others who may also be training at the same time. There are no set rules about sharing the back room or a ring, but common sense and common courtesy should prevail. Give each other space, maintain control of your dog, share the equipment, and above all be respectful. There's no reason several people cannot train at the same time.

TRAINING TIP

TRAIN HARD TRIAL EASY!

How many times has it happened to you? You're running a course and all of a sudden you lose track of your dog. How did that happen? Did your dog check in with you to see what obstacle was next? Were you giving your dog the correct signal at the appropriate time? Did you take your eyes off your dog breaking that subtle constant communication between you and your dog? Now we all know that you can't look your dog in the eye the whole time you are running a course because you need to maneuver your way around the obstacles. So how do we keep that visual communication going when we have to look away? Try walking across the room and without turning your head, use your peripheral vision to see what is going on around you. Now, walk the course. Pretend your dog is running beside you. Look at where your dog will take-off and land. Imagine a turn or where he will exit a tunnel. Practice using your peripheral vision and it will eventually become a habit keeping that connection of communication between you and your dog.
